A Message from Bethel’s Administrator & CEO

As you all are aware, COVID-19 continues to be an active risk across our nation. In June, Bethel began the re-opening process by allowing outdoor visits with loved ones. In early July, Lake County began to see an increase in the number of positive COVID-19 cases. In mid-July, Bethel Lutheran home reported its first positive case of COVID-19 to state and local health officials.

The safety and well-being of our residents and staff is our top priority. We are doing what we can to limit the spread of COVID-19 within the Bethel Community campus, including staying in close communication with local and state

health officials to ensure we are taking all the appropriate steps under the current circumstances.

In addition to the guidance we have received from the South Dakota Department of Health, we will continue to follow guidance received by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to reduce the spread and impact of COVID-19, such as: enhanced infection control precautions; screening residents, staff, and essential visitors; restricting entry

into the building; and testing staff and residents as necessary, based on current protocols.

Due to privacy requirements, we cannot divulge specific information about an individual who has a confirmed case of COVID-19 unless you have the necessary permissions to receive such information. We know you are concerned about your loved one and will contact the responsible person directly if they are suspected or diagnosed with COVID-19.

Staying connected with friends and family is vital to our resident’s psychosocial well-being. Family members and friends are encouraged to stay connected with loved ones through video chat, Zoom, calls window visits, and letters.

Thank you for your support and understanding as we all work together to safely navigate the COVID-19 pandemic.





Bethel Boiler Replacement = Comfort and Efficiencies

Friends of Bethel donations made it possible for the Foundation to replace our nearly 30-year-old heating system. The 1990+ boiler steam heat system was beyond its life expectancy, availability of parts, and had become undependable. Over the past two years of constant maintenance, electricity outages during the September flooding, and efficiencies to be gained, it was the priority to be replaced for Bethel Lutheran Home. Also, it was necessary to ensure residents with stable heat for comfort and to provide the hot water for our kitchen, laundry and resident room sinks and whirlpool.

Throughout our need to maintain the recent boiler and heating system, Barger Electric had provided necessary parts, adjustments, and consultation to maintain

a heat source. They also assisted us with options to replace our current boiler to include a large step stage single boiler or a system with two modulating boilers to meet various levels of building output year-round and that could also handle state required temperature of at least 160 degrees for laundry in an approved long-term care facility.

Rick Barger worked with Bethel in the design and layout to use the current piping throughout the approximately 40,000 square foot facility. His goal was to collapse what had been two boilers for the building and laundry, into one two-stage modulating boiler system for improved consistent heat with quicker response and improved efficiencies with the use of the current distribution system. The system was then ready to be cleaned with a special recirculating pump and chemical until the correct PH balance of the water was reached and the system flushed clean.

Then the old system had to be dismantled, removed, and disposed of properly.

A new 4-inch piping system was built to connect the two new modulating boilers to the nursing home and to the two new 80-gallon laundry heat tanks. Therefore, laundry now has 160 gallons of hot water at a minimum constant temperature of 170 degrees.

Many days of labor and expertise were provided to remove and install new equipment to convert our system. We appreciated the efforts made by Barger to ensure that Bethel had a heat source throughout the conversion for resident comfort, staff usage and laundry water temperature standards.

The new modulating boiler system has a capacity of 1.6 million BTU's. This summer only one boiler ran at approximately 27% for the laundry, kitchen, facility bathrooms and whirlpool. During the recent winter, both boilers have run up to 54% to carry the load.

The new boiler system was functional in February and has already made an impact on cost reduction. Long-time business partner and Bethel contributor Rick Barger of Barger Electric worked with us to meet health requirements, improved efficiencies, and

payback on this project. Also, Barger is assisting us with improvements on wiring of the building to support electronic enhancements needed for our alarm systems, replacement generator and resident room call system infrastructure.

Finally, Barger Electric owner Rick Barger, made a gift-in-kind of \$8,843, which was a portion of the project labor cost. Thank you for sharing your expertise as a business partner and generosity in support of Bethel.

Beth'el ... House of God

I learned the significance of our name, "Bethel," just recently.

The word Bethel has its origin from the Hebrew (beth) house and ('el) God, literally "house of God."

It is defined as a hallowed spot ... a place where God is worshipped, a holy place.

From Genesis 28:17, 19

I grew up attending Sunday services in the Fedora Endeavor Presbyterian Church and upon moving, I transferred my membership to Trinity Lutheran Church of Madison. Recently, I heard my childhood pastor giving a sermon on the radio. It related to this special place, Bethel Lutheran Community, so I asked Reverend Richard (Dick) Poppen if I could share parts of it here. He graciously said yes. I hope it helps you go to your

sacred place to feel His presence.

... For some folks it is a quiet early morning driving on silent back roads of the countryside and looking at crops. But its more, it's the spiritual relationship with God's creation, it's the simple joy of a mother duck parading her trailing band across the road to the safety of tall grass, it's the dew shimmering from the blue grass; it's the fabulous first color of the sunrise hinting at a new day. For some, it is a stop, even on a busy day, even from the seat of a tractor, at the top of the ridge that divides the James River Valley with the northeast Prairie Lakes Country, just to take it in. And for some, it is the morning coffee ritual. Quiet, sacred, spiritual places and times. It was in such a place that Jacob discovered the presence of God. He called it Bethel, Beth - el, house of God.

To make something meaningful out of the set amount of days we have been given, we need a sacred

place, a spiritual place, a holy time. Where are our places and times when we can stop for a moment in the dizzying pace of active lives and seek the holy presence and the direction of the One who has made us?

Maybe an experience from the past takes you back to a place, ordinary to others, but significant to you because something so important happened there. In my case, a fence line takes me back to a special grandpa who had us walk along behind him with a coffee can filled with re-purposed wire fasteners and re-straightened staples to affix barbed wire on ancient wooden posts. From that place we were related to generations of family, the old wagon trail of pioneers from a century before brought kinship to folks we would not know and in touch with another

time. We could feel near to the God who made it all, a sacred place. We need to ask, where have we been in the presence of God, that cause us to look back and wonder, "Surely God was in that place!" Didn't we feel the Spirit, if only for a moment.

During the overpowering, frustrating experiences of these days, wondering about our health and well-being, we need the holy place, and a holy time where we can seek to discover the direction of God and the assurance of God for this day, for tomorrow, and for all time ...

Due to 25 original Lutheran churches in 1961, we have Bethel, "house of God," where our loved ones can live with care provided to their mind, body, and soul.
